Needed a place for children to play

ith their backyard patio in disrepair, weeds filling other areas, and their desire for separate areas to entertain adults and have kids play safely and happily, the owners of a suburban home in Weston, Wisconsin, hired designer Susan M. Murphy Jones for help. Her biggest challenge was to find a way to have space for each of the main functions despite the backyard's shallow 40' depth. She set up a large playground atop an 8" bed of ground wood chips by the property's rear edge, which would be a safe landing for children coming off the slide or falling off the swings. And she left no less than 6' to 8' all around, so children could run freely and find places to play with other toys. (The other choice for child safety would have been ground clean rubber mulch, but that was more expensive initially to purchase, she says.) To help separate the playground and entertaining areas, Jones designed a large berm in between, which she planted with catmint and accented with a single lilac standard and several hefty boulders. For continuity throughout the project, she ran additional concrete gray pavers as a soldier course to outline the new beds.
